

Jan AngelFACTS

Representative Jan Angel claims that ALEC is just another organization she belongs to, but her actions speak louder than her campaign rhetoric. Here are the facts about Angels' voting record and campaign contributions from ALEC members.

Q: Who is "ALEC" and what's Jan Angel's connection?

A: ALEC is the American Legislative Exchange Council, a corporate bill factory that churns out state legislation to benefit some of the country's largest corporations. ALEC's bills include the infamous "Stand Your Ground" laws and the law to require teaching climate change denial in schools. Jan Angel was chosen as the "State Legislator of the Year" in 2012 and she is also ALEC co-chair in Washington.

Q: What other connections to ALEC does she have?

A: ALEC members have donated **more than \$150,000** to her campaign. Among these ALEC members are some of the biggest offenders – **Big Oil** (BP), **Big Tobacco** (Altria, aka Philip Morris), the **NRA**, the **Koch Brothers** (Georgia Pacific), **Big Coal** (BNSF Railway), numerous **Big Pharma** companies (Astrazeneca, GlaxoSmithKline, and Takeda Pharmaceuticals) as well as Big Insurance companies (Farmers Insurance and Liberty Mutual Insurance Co.) Q: Has Jan Angel sponsored any ALEC legislation?

A: Yes. She sponsored **HB 2772**, the Climate Accountability Act, which is almost word for word the same legislation as ALEC's model bill: <http://fusewa.me/1a3OoPA>, among other bills she has sponsored and voted for.

Q: Why are ALEC members working so hard to elect Jan Angel?

A: Because Jan Angel has sided with ALEC members instead of Washington families time and time again.

- Angel chose to protect tax loopholes for **Big Oil** companies instead of more money for kids' schools. (HB 2038)
- She sided with **Big Insurance** and sponsored legislation that would have cut access to life-saving cancer screenings and coverage for diabetes and autism screenings for kids (House Bill 1361).
- She sided with **Big Tobacco companies** to oppose a cigarette tax increase (HB 2493) and opposed closing a tax loophole for roll-your-own cigarettes (HB 2565)
